RE: Matsakis Mercury Report

Dear Member of the Environment, Public Health and Food Safety Committee,

A recent Eurobarometer survey of public opinion shows high levels of public concern about pollutants in food such as mercury (59%)¹. Given the highly toxic nature of mercury, and its dispersal far beyond its sources of release, such concern is justifiable. We are now learning that even relatively low doses can seriously harm the development of the brain, and possibly the cardiovascular, immune and reproductive systems.

In Europe, public health is already being compromised. Between 3 to 15 million people, in coastal areas and in central and northern Europe, have body levels around the US reference dose, which is more protective than the level referred to in Europe. Large numbers of regional populations have ten times that dose – a level where there is clear neurological harm. At the same time, the healthcare sector, which must cope with the health problems resulting from mercury, is itself a contributor to the problem. The health care sector uses many mercury-containing medical devices (such as thermometers, gastro-intestinal tubes and blood pressure gauges), as well as amalgams and other products. The devices often break, thereby posing a great occupational risk. Even when properly disposed of, they eventually release mercury into the environment through medical waste incineration.

You will be voting on the Matsakis Draft Report on the Community Strategy on Mercury on February 22nd. This is your chance to send a clear signal to the Commission about the importance of taking concrete measures to protect people's health from mercury that is
